

Long ago, God spoke of man's disposition regarding "self": "All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned, everyone to his own way," Isaiah 53:6.

God is still in the miracle business. I will always reflect fondly upon my ninety days at Straight Street because it was there that my life was transformed by God from one of intense pain, utter misery and dark hopelessness, to one of undeserved mercy, bountiful grace and peaceful joy.

My addiction was only a side effect of a deeper problem. I was completely selfish. My trust and hope had been placed on people and things that would ultimately fail me. I attempted to fill the void I felt inside of me with almost everything the world had to offer, all of which proved to be very temporary, unfulfilling and poisonous. I spent literally everything I had during my downward spiral of worldly living, losing everyone and everything I held dear. Finally, I found myself with nothing, wallowing in the mud with pigs.

But much like the prodigal son that Jesus spoke of, I came to my senses to the reality that there is a better way to live. I was able to be brutally honest in the fact that I had been living a life that was sinful against heaven and the Father. Then I got up and went to my Father to repent of my many sins.

I found that the Father saw me coming from a long way off. He met me, where I was, with compassion, forgiveness and unconditional love. He blessed me with everything I was lacking. He rejoiced in the fact that one of His sons who was dead, is now alive; was lost, but now is found.

I wake up each day content with the fact that His grace is sufficient, that He will never leave me or forsake me, and that I can do all things through Him as long as my faith and trust remains on my Lord, Jesus Christ.

I once shared with a brother, who was new to the Gospel Ministry, that one of the most difficult places to minister can be the church house. On the surface, such a comment would seem to be quite paradoxical. However, in my experience, the comfort, safety, routines of the House of God can often lull the congregation into a sense of complacency. In other words, it is all too easy for church folks to forget that we are just as dependent on the Lord for our daily needs as the lost man struggling on the street. From the minister's point of view, teaching the Word to the "comfortably numb" can be exasperating. As he will often hear a chorus of "amens," see a wave of heads nodding in agreement, but note very little true response to the message delivered.

As I was explaining this puzzle to the brother I was discipling, I went on to share where he would likely find the most receptive and malleable audiences. "The easiest place to teach and preach," I explained, "are the groups that are aware of their desperation." The person who is desperate for a change is like the proverbial deer panting for the water. In truth, this category should and does include us all.

Unfortunately, the comforts of religion often rock us to sleep, and we forget our daily need for Jesus.

One of the primary reasons I love teaching at Straight Street is because I get to forego the teeth pull stage of re-convincing the attendees that "you are messed up, and you desperately need Jesus...right now". The men that God has called to The Street are well aware that they have issues...I am well aware that I have issues...we are all a bunch of messed up men on a search for THE ANSWER. Anytime a broken and contrite heart comes before our God, He opens His arms, welcomes it in, and applies the love and change it so desperately needs. God's promises to the desperate are still true: Seek...Ask...Knock, Draw near to me and I'll draw near to you, blessed are the poor in spirit for theirs is the Kingdom of God.

I once heard a preacher say, "Evangelism is just one beggar showing another beggar where the food is." Wow! How simple, yet how profound. I'm just a beggar, in need of bread. When I gather with the men at Straight Street, we experience the privilege of pulling up to the Master's table together. And there's nothing more fulfilling than feasting from the Father's supply.


Damascus Home runs solely off the donations made by individuals, churches, and businesses.

Each year people reunite and everywhere there is evidence of light and transformation in the lives of the gatherers. When he graduated from Straight Street, Tucker elected to continue in the program and entered into the 12-month aftercare phase offered by the Damascus Home Ministry. Upon completion, he was admitted to seminary classes at LeTourneau University. He traveled to Lebanon to teach English as a



second language on a mission project. He returned in July. When we received word from him, he relayed a message to the prayer warriors on behalf of the people of Lebanon who are in so much pain, abuse and darkness. His request made our hearts burn for the people to whom he ministers that he was able to reach and touch. Jim Cooley, the ministry's Executive Director, also spoke.
